Nature of support focus of PPG spending during the year 2017/2018	Cost	(Green shows that the provision will continue, Orange that is will cease)
Inclusion and well- being Nursery Nurse	24, 152	Over 30 children had support on a sustained basis including access to play therapy. 24 children had short term support to cope with circumstances giving them opportunities to talk and develop coping strategies. A daily lunchtime club has helped small groups to develop play and friendship skills. As a result children's well being has been supported and they have been happy coming to school.
Family Worker	22, 904	83 families had support to improve attendance using our graduated system. As a result there has been an improvement in attendance for many pupils. For example, child A went from 80% attendance to 93% and achieved end of year expectations.
		14 families have had support via the Early Help system meaning they have had help to cope with challenging situations beyond school which would otherwise have had the potential to impact the pupils' achievements negatively.
Support from Educational/ Clinical psychologist to develop targeted support	2500	Mr Turner saw 19 pupils and gave advice which has enabled them to make at least good progress.  4 of them are now under assessment for Education Health and Care plans which will help them access even greater long term support.

Librarian  School's Library service subscription		The library continues to provide a vibrant environment where children are timetabled to research, choose and borrow resources to help encourage a desire and love of reading. Alongside this experience they are learning library skills that are transferable for their visits to public libraries.  Towards the end of this academic year, we have completed a full stock check of the library, deleted and recycled outdated books. We are now in the process of refreshing the library stock with over 2,000 new resources which will include titles relevant for our Year 6 classes. Our School Library Subscription has provided a complete change of our bulk loan this year. As a result the library provides the resources needed to enrich the curriculum.  Our successful Book Fair provided an opportunity for parents to accompany their children to browse resources and/or purchase books. This event raised £1,000 which has enabled the purchase of new resources for the library.  Other enrichment events that have promoted reading to our children this year include, World Book Day, Book Swap and the Reading Challenge Assembly. This has supported the enjoyment and love of reading across the school.

TA to support daily reading	6222	This was targeted to Year 1. The cohort achieved 82% at age related expectations which was a rise of 7% from the end of early years. They also achieved 32% of pupils exceeding expectations, a rise of 22% from the end of Early Years.

Whole school EAL resources (those who are PP eligible)	1000	Whole school EAL resources (those who are PP eligible) were purchased to support new arrival pupils, all of whom made at least good progress.  In year 1 this extra support focused around phonics led to 88% EAL learners achieving the standard for the phonics screen (7% higher than the cohort as a whole).
Raising attainment multicultural workshops		100% positive feedback from pupils and staff. Pupils feedback that they know more about different cultures and learnt new skills.  As a result children and parents comment positively on the celebration of their own heritage and the curriculum is clearly reflective of our pupils. This supports the sense of becoming vital to well being. For example, a child in Year 4 who manifested as very shy in class became significantly more animated and enthused as a result of these sessions.

#### Year 1 Phonics Screening Test:

81% pupils passed the phonics screen in the cohort. 63% of pupil premium eligible pupils passed compared to 69% of children eligible for pupil premium nationally (2017 national data). However it is worth noting that 5 out of these 16 pupils have additional special needs.

### Year 2 Phonics Screening Test:

20% pupil premium eligible pupils passed those who didn't have additional special needs and are being supported to learn to read using alternate strategies.
