What are KS2 SATS?



- SATS stands for Standardised Attainment Tests which are compulsory for all Y6 children in state schools so long as they are accessing the Key Stage 2 curriculum.
- Children are tested in Reading, GPS (Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling) and Maths.
- Writing is assessed by your child's teacher.

When are GGA Mock SATs?



- Monday 9th March: Grammar Punctuation and Spelling
- Tuesday 10th March: Reading
- Wednesday 11th March: Arithmetic (Paper 1) and Reasoning (Paper 2)
- Thursday 12th March: Reasoning (Paper 3)

When are UK YR6 SATs?



- Monday 11th May: Grammar Punctuation and Spelling
- Tuesday 12th May: Reading
- Wednesday 13th May: Arithmetic (Paper 1) and Reasoning (Paper 2)
- Thursday 14th May: Reasoning (Paper 3)

How will my child be tested?



- Tests generally take place in classrooms
- Some children in smaller rooms
- All materials provided
- Work in silence
- Timed. Some children entitled to extra time.



The area of the large shaded triangle is double the area of the small shaded triangle.





Some questions that were asked during the evening:



- ***What time does my child need to arrive?***

Your children need to arrive at the normal time of 8:30am. In May, Class teachers will then register and walk them down to the hall to have breakfast.

- ***What time will the tests start?***

We do a little revision so children are feeling extra confident and then we will conduct the papers. Time are dependent on the tests we have on the day. Each test has a time limit and we need to ensure we do not run into the pupils lunch time.

- ***What are SATs for?***

SATs are Standard Assessment Tests designed to find out if children, across the UK, are on track to meet the expected standard in Maths and English, set out by the government. SATs are also used by secondary school to generate target GCSE grade. However, anything can happen until your children reach that stage therefore, the results let the Secondary schools know what your children excel in and what they may need more support in, taught by their specialist teachers.
