

Vocabulary

Sacrifice

is the offering of food, objects or the lives of animals or humans to a higher purpose, in particular divine beings, as an act of worship

Salvation

in Christianity, or deliverance or redemption, is the "saving [of] human beings from death and separation from God" by Christ's death and resurrection.

Martyr

a person who is killed because of their religious or other beliefs.

Communion

a Christian sacrament in which consecrated bread and wine are consumed as memorials of Christ's death or as symbols for the realization of a spiritual union between Christ and communicant or as the body and blood of Christ.

Why are we learning this?

So we can answer the question 'what do Christians believe Jesus did to 'save' people?

Why is it important?

So we can give our own responses to the idea of sacrifice, recognising different points of view.

What am I going to learn?

To outline the 'big story' of the Bible, explaining how incarnation and salvation fit within it.

To make connections between the Christian belief in Jesus' death as a sacrifice and how Christians celebrate Holy Communion/ the Lord's Supper

To show how Christians put their beliefs into practice in different ways.

To weigh up the value and impact of ideas of sacrifice in our own lives and the world today.

Vocabulary

Brahman

The faith of many religions is centred on a god or gods. For Hindus, Brahman is the ultimate reality – one 'Supreme Spirit' in many forms. Brahman is male, female and even animal.



Atman

is a Sanskrit word that means inner self, spirit, or soul



Samsara

is the continuous cycle of life, death, and reincarnation envisioned in Hinduism and other Indian religions.

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Why are we learning this?

So we can answer the question 'What helps Hindu people as they try to be good?'

Why is it important?

So we can reflect on and articulate what impact belief in karma and dharma might have on individuals and the world.

What am I going to learn?

To identify and explain Hindu beliefs, e.g. dharma, karma, samsara and moksha.

To give meanings for the story of the man in the well and explain how it relates to Hindu beliefs about samsara, moksha and dharma.

To make clear connections between Hindu beliefs about dharma, karma, samsara and moksha and ways Hindus live.

To connect the four Hindu aims of life and the four stages of life with beliefs about dharma, karma, moksha.

To give evidence and examples to show how Hindus put their beliefs into practice in different ways

To make connections between Hindu beliefs and explain how and why they are important to Hindus.
